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PROFESSIONAL PROFILE SUMMARY BIOGRAPHY

Dr Omeri is a respected academic alumnus of the University of Sydney's Faculty of Nursing and Cumberland College of Health Sciences. A Fellow of the Royal College of Nursing, Australia, now the Australian College of Nursing, she earned her PhD in Transcultural Nursing from the University of Sydney, completing the first study in this field in Australia. Today Dr Omeri is a leading advocate in Transcultural nursing with a national and international reputation as an educator and researcher in this field of nursing practice.

Her doctoral research shed insight into the health beliefs and practices of Iranian immigrants in Australia within a mono-cultural health system. Her work led to the development of an extensive body of literature examining the cultural diversity of different client groups, particularly immigrants, refugees and indigenous groups, and the promotion of culturally congruent, evidence-based strategies and practices.

An acknowledged national leader of transcultural nursing she is recognized internationally by the Transcultural Nursing Society (TCNS) as a Certified Transcultural Nurse (TCN-Advanced) and as a Transcultural Nursing Scholar. She has received national recognition for her work in this field with the award of the Order of Australia (OAM).

She has taught the theory, concepts and practice of transcultural nursing in schools of nursing in Australia, Iran, USA and Saudi Arabia as a member of faculty and has taught them to students in disciplines other than nursing.

An innovator in teaching methods she has developed curricula, designed courses, and adapted programs to suit the context of, not only Australian tertiary education settings, but to meet the education requirements of linguistically and culturally different student groups particularly in the practice areas of community health nursing, primary healthcare, child and family health, palliative care and aged care.

As a TCN consultant, due to her broad experience in implementing transcultural nursing concepts in clinical settings and her reputation as a scholar, she is sought out, nationally and internationally, to supervise, guide and support nursing students at all levels of academic development, particularly those caring for diverse population groups and wishing to engage in transcultural nursing practice or to qualify as TCN nurses.

Partnering with the former Royal College of Nursing, Australia she established a TCN Society and a network of TCN nurses which led the formulation of a TCN policy adopted nationally by the College.

Dr Omeri promotes transcultural nursing as a pathway to the globalization of the nursing profession for embedded in its practice are opportunities for improving the health of communities world-wide through informed, culturally congruent care and leadership.

I was able to consolidate Transcultural Nursing as a field of study, practice and research In this role. During this period I published several book chapters, many articles in refereed journals, and co-edited the Special Issue of Contemporary Nurse, Advances in Transcultural Nursing (2008), as well as advising staff on Transcultural nursing issues upon request. I continued presenting at national and international TCN Conferences to build upon the growing evidenced based TCN knowledge informing nursing practices.

1990-1997: School of Nursing, Cumberland College of Health Sciences, NSW Australia

Position: Lecturer, School of Nursing, Cumberland College of Health Sciences, NSW Australia.

I taught nursing, at this time, in a number of subjects including; Health Promotion, Child and Family Nursing, Clinical Practice in the laboratory, and supervision of BN and BSN students in the clinical settings, as well as participating in planning clinical placements for undergraduate students.

1990: These years at Cumberland provided the foundation for my leadership in TCN and where my pioneering contributions began.

- I had the good fortune of a supportive and forward thinking staff at Cumberland College of Health Sciences, School of Nursing as well as a Continuing Education Committee who supported my initiative in establishing Transcultural nursing at the School of Nursing at Cumberland.
- I developed a course titled 'Multiculturalism and nursing' and began teaching it as early as 1991. Staff members and external experts, such as trauma survivors from STARTTS (Services for Treatment and Rehabilitation of Torture and Trauma survivors) informed the course. This unit was designed for R- BN students

1991: I undertook a survey of schools of nursing in Australia in order to establish the status of TCN teachings/education in Australian Nursing Schools (findings reported elsewhere)

1992 & 1994: In the early 1990, I began planning for further study to pursue research and doctoral studies in Nursing. I began corresponding with Dr Leininger in the late 1980s, seeking her guidance in pursuing TCN studies. I was invited by Dr Leininger to undertake a course (post-masters) in TCN in May 1992 and following approval attended a Summer

Special Course in TCN at Wayne State University, Detroit Michigan, USA. The course was taught by Dr Leininger. My research on Macedonian immigrants in NSW was concurrent with PhD study which was already in progress. In 1994 I re-enrolled in another course taught by Dr Leininger at (WSU) to study ethnonursing qualitative research and Leininger-Templin-Thompson (LTT Computer Pg.), a computer data analysis package for qualitative data analysis generated in using ethnonursing research methods.

Concurrent with my PhD study and research, I was able to advance planning of a new course in TCN and began teaching the subject following approval from the board of postgraduate studies. (This course was designed at postgraduate level for MN and PhD students).

1994: In preparation for my advanced PhD study, I began to guide and supervise students in TCN research. One of my first BN students, Deborah Brooks, completed a study of the 'Views on vaccination of Lebanese Muslim Immigrants in NSW Australia'

1996: I completed my PhD in Transcultural Nursing on "Care Values, Beliefs and Practices of Iranian Immigrants in NSW Australia". It was the first PhD study in Australia in the field of TCN.

1993-1994: I sought RCNA's support for TCN at a national level. The move was successful in promoting awareness of TCN nationally and in gaining recognition. The move resulted in the establishment of a national network of nurses either involved in caring for diverse populations or interested in sharing related issues. A TCN network/society was established, a newsletter produced by TCN-RCNA and regular meetings were held which I chaired for 3 terms (3.years). National policies were reviewed and renewed relating to culturally appropriate nursing care and Indigenous people of Australia; monographs published as part of the RCNA continuing education series.

As a member of the Continuing Education Committee at Cumberland School of nursing I instigated 3 annual national TCN conferences in 1992-1994 hosted by Cumberland College, School of Nursing.

I also initiated 2 TCN national conferences hosted in Sydney NSW Australia, in (1998) and the year (2000).

1997-2003: The University of Sydney, Faculty of Nursing;

Position: Senior Lecturer, Faculty of Nursing, University of Sydney, NSW Australia.
(Cumberland College of Health Science merged with University of Sydney and the School of Nursing and the Faculty of Nursing at Sydney University became one Faculty).

- Introduced and began teaching a comprehensive teaching in TCN for graduate students and students undertaking research in Transcultural nursing.
- The first PhD student completing TCN study of CCT with Mauritian immigrants' in NSW. I mentored the student and she attended TCN course.
- This study of the first PhD discovered and outlined the first set of TCN Competencies for Midwifery practice, suited to Mauritian immigrants which could be applied to midwifery practice in Australia. The study used Leininger's CCT and Ethnonursing Research Methods and the study completed in 2003.
- It was gratifying to see this time growing numbers of graduate nurses interested in TCN for their Masters of doctoral studies

Position: Team Leader of Newtown Community Health Care Centre,

This role involved leadership/management of a multidisciplinary health care team, providing physical health, mental health and social welfare services to populations residing in Newtown, Enmore, Camperdown and Erskineville. The Centre was staffed with a multidisciplinary health care team, with diverse cultural backgrounds. Cultural diversity among the staff and served by the community health care team, called for better understanding of issues confronting immigrants and people of diverse and/or similar cultural backgrounds. The team worked in collaboration with the range of services including: Aboriginal health and welfare services, schools, early childhood centers, probation parole; youth centers, drug and alcohol and a range of businesses, neighbourhood centers, community action groups and developed strong linkages with major hospitals, nursing homes and other health care and social welfare services.

Experiences in the community prompted me to move to academia in order to establish and initiate Transcultural Nursing as a specialty area of study, research and practice.

Position: Nurse Educator, Prince Henry-Prince of Wales hospitals;

Prior to above academic position/s and during my early years of teaching in NSW Australia, I was employed as 'nurse educator' at the Nursing Education Centre, in these hospitals for two years. In this role I taught nursing science, maternal-infant nursing as well as a number of other subjects.

My academic career has been committed to transcultural nursing and related issues based upon my personal and professional experience, firstly as a student of the discipline then as an academic and educator and researcher. I introduced Australian nurses to this discipline; encouraged its growth and application in practice; pursued the development of TCN knowledge through my own research and promoted the discipline through publications and presentations and supported nurses applying TN concepts and practices in their nursing practice/work.

The move to academia led to my foundational work in establishing the first courses/units of study in undergraduate and Master of Nursing (MN) courses at Cumberland College of Health Sciences. These courses enabled students to undertake basic and advanced studies and research in Transcultural nursing education and practice.

Advocacy in Transcultural nursing and related issues/publications

In my academic career, since 1990, I have published over 65+ original peer-reviewed research papers in a range of reputable international and Australian Journals, chapters in books, and in national nursing newspapers (Nursing Review and Connections) with my first joint publication in Medical Journal of Australia in 1975. The topics such as Maternal – Child Health, Community Nursing, Indigenous students, health care issues confronting refugees and asylum seekers, and Transcultural nursing as a discipline are among the range of my publications.

As guest editor, I completed the Special Issue of Contemporary Nurse on Contemporary Advances in TCN 2e/28 (1-2): 2008. I have authored 21 book chapters and two books/monographs since 1995 and my work is frequently cited in nursing, social science and other health science literature, nationally and internationally.
